### **Introduction and Overview**

What are the growing impacts of changing climate has had an impact on Health Care for the Homeless efforts across the county? Climate change impacts on health, mortality and emerging types of unexpected emergencies that HCHs will increasingly need to be prepared to respond to:

- Heat/Cold
- Extreme Weather (tornados, storms, floods, hurricanes)

### **Lucy Kasdin:**

Use Daily Disasters to Build Effective Relationships with Climate/Crisis-Affected: Where to Start?

- Understanding the landscape in your community
- Learn who is already serving this community
- Know those most vulnerable among your unhoused population
- Recognize barriers receiving real-time information during emergency and plan to address









# Use Daily Disasters to Build Effective Relationships with Climate/ Crisis-Affected: Bridge Building

Ground your work in an understanding of why there is mistrust and trauma, and how this impacts relationship building

Identify and build/strengthen relationships with:

- Trusted community messengers
- Key stakeholders and advocate
- Local and regional government agencies









## Use Daily Disasters to Build Effective Relationships with Climate/Crisis-Affected": Using Daily Disasters as Opportunities

- Prepare for Anticipated (Heat, cold, storms) and Unexpected Emergencies (toxic plume, fires):
  - Who is needed to respond? What resources are needed?

  - Develop clear communication plan
- Use "Daily Disasters" to bring together key stakeholders to response
- Keep Learning: Track lessons learned, formalize debriefing and use prior incidents to improve community response









# Brittany Melton-Hill: Focusing in on Making an Extreme Weather Response-Denver CO

**Who:** Do you know your unhoused population? Large encampments vs. smaller encampments vs. individual rough sleepers

What: How will your services differ from your day-to-day operations

When: Determine thresholds for activation, when possible

**Where:** Know the unique specifics of the geographical region you provide services to and how these specifics might affect the success of your response

**How:** Leverage relationships already built with other service providers inside/outside of your organization









## **Extreme Weather Response: WHEN**

- Acknowledge that different services might require different thresholds (Cooling/Warming Centers vs. Street Med vs. Outreach)
- Reflect on reality of how things went "on the ground" at the threshold and adjust appropriately, when possible
- Consider situations where the threshold might not be the best gauge for activating a response










# **Extreme Weather Response: WHERE**



Purple locations are traditional shelters

Red locations are various warming centers (overnight)

Shaded in area is where staff are usually deployed during extreme cold weather emergencies











# **Extreme Weather Response: HOW**

- Strategize what services to provide at what point in the disaster.
  - Consider how you can maximize time/skill of staff and the resources you (and other organizations/stakeholders) can provide.
- Consider barriers to clients accessing shelters and extreme weather relief centers. Provide alternative resources/options when available and appropriate.
- If possible, plan a staffing model that allows for flexibility and balances the workload to try and prevent staff burnout.









# Stephanie Martinez Extreme Heat & other emergencies – Circle the City Phoenix

#### **Heat Related Deaths in Maricopa County**

- 645 heat related deaths in Maricopa County during 2023.
- 71 percent of heat related deaths occurred on a day when the Weather Service issued an excessive heat warning.
- 45 percent of heat related deaths were among people experiencing homelessness.

#### **Shifting our Care Model**

- Death Prevention
- Heat Relief: Cooling Station and Hydration Stations
- Hours of Operation
- Staff Wellness

#### **Collaboration & Partnerships**

• Connecting with county, city, and other community organizations in effort to positively impact the lives of those facing homelessness during extreme heat.

#### **Supplies**

- Water
- Ice
- Propel/Electrolyte packets
- Wound Care Supplies
- Hats
- "Summer" Kindness Kits











# Extreme Cold & other emergencies – Hennepin County MN Susannah King

#### Winter weather in Minneapolis

- 72 days on average at or below freezing
- Of these days, about 22 are sub-zero temperatures
- This does not take into account bitterly cold days with windchill, leading to increased risk for cold-related conditions such as hypothermia and frostbite

Snapshot of numbers from Hennepin County Last winter (from 2023 PIT count):

469 individuals unsheltered and outside 2,422 people in emergency shelter 421 people in transitional housing













## Outreach- Multi-Agency response to cold weather

- We see an increase of exposure related conditions each winter
- Last winter we treated 35 individuals for frostbite
- 2 additional shelters open during the winter
- Temporary shelter/warming space opens during the extreme cold (1-2 days at a time)
- When it is bitterly cold, outreach teams will make rounds and offer to drive people to inside emergency shelter
- Community does warm weather gear drives














Housing Stability area of Hennepin County organize and designated warming centers and emergency winter shelters.

#### **HCH Street Medicine & Outreach Team care in the field**

- Person-centered harm reduction approach
- Trust and rapport
- Can do some wound care in the field, using small pop-up tent or vehicle in cold weather conditions
- Delivering basic needs supplies, medication, wound care supplies
- Safe use supplies and Narcan kits













# Stabilization - From encampment to respite care: a community response

- HCH both identifies and partners with other outreach agencies to identify people who need respite beds
- Low barrier access to HCH's respite program for people suffering from frostbite or other health issue
- Outreach staff able to move patient directly from an encampment into respite
- Once in respite, patient was able to stay in respite through healing and amputation, offering daily dressing changes, care coordination, etc.













## Other weather-related response

#### **Heat in Minneapolis**


- It is rare for temperatures to go above 100 degrees (average once every 4-5 years)
- Heat + humidity are a factor for heat related conditions
- Cooling centers also function as a refuge from poor air quality due to smoke from Canadian wildfires



Cross-Departmental Hennepin County Response:

#### Public Health

- Health Care for the Homeless
- Public Health Department Data Analyst Team
  - Data analyzation and distribution to inform the work
- Ryan White Grant Administration
  - Increasing funding for staff
  - Facilitate housing focus group
  - Lived experience survey
- Public Health Clinic Team
  - Disease investigation, increasing FTE
  - Expanding case management programming
  - Centralizing Narcan supply and ordering
- Community Based Infectious Disease Team
  - RNs working within HCH, expanding efforts to address syphilis, Hep C

# Agency response & partnerships Clare Housing

- Innovative housing programming
- Hotel voucher program
- Increased outreach

#### Avivo

- Tiny Village housing, dedicated harm reduction housing
- Outreach team











# **Example - Mobilizing across agencies during crisis**

- May 28, 2020 response during George Floyd demonstrations
- Several large encampments in the city due to COVID/sheltering in place
- One in the area near the 3<sup>rd</sup> precinct in Minneapolis and site for protests
- MDH, Hennepin County, outreach agencies, community partners, City of Minneapolis mobilized to evacuate this encampment, coordinating shelter, transportation, food, etc
- Residents were relocated to a hotel as concern for fires and safety rose

# Criminalization of Homelessness Compounds Adverse Health Impact of Extreme Urban Heat

- Climate change exacerbates everything, but PEH are hit first, foremost and hardest.
- Encampment sweeps evict people from the shelter of bridges or the shade of tents thus placing them in harms way, forcing them to relocate to alternative shade
- Hostile architecture often prevents the homeless from seeking shade and shelter
- Increasing stress, leading to higher drug overdoses, hospitalizations and increased mortality (JAMA Study, April 2023)
- Elevating institutional mistrust, which harms outreach efforts people are dehumanized as "service resistant"
- Breaking links between vulnerable people and their service providers

#### **Changing the Dominant Dehumanizing Narrative of Homelessness**

- First Rule of Holes: Stop Digging!!!!!! Criminalization is an expensive way to make homelessness worse
- Localities MUST suspend sweeps and food-sharing bans during heat emergencies
- Providers have a moral duty to identify policies that harm their patients
- Promote the JAMA Study, April 2023, demonstrating how encampment sweeps harm the health of the homeless
- Stop using dehumanizing terms that enable criminalization -- "service resistant" or "shelter resistant"
- Promote street medicine and peer support services
- Establish Cooling Centers, suspend coordinated entry
